- (f) Sir Gawain and the Green Knight is a fine specimen of the English medieval romance. Discuss.
- (g) Consider The Nun's Priest's Tale as a beast fable.
- (h) The main charm of *The Nun's Priest's Tale* lies in its humorous treatment of marital relationships. Do you accept the view? Discuss with a close reference to the text.
- (i) Write a note on the role of Priesthood in Everyman.
- (j) Gawain is courteous but not a stereotype of virtue.
