- (c) Attempt a comparative study of Oodgeroo Noonuccal's poems "Assimilation-No!" and "Integration-Yes!" to show the poet's take on the two conflicting policies:
- (d) What does Ashcroft mean by the title The Empire writes Back?

 - (a) Comment on the use of various symbols and images in Surfacing.
 - (b) Discuss Atwood's portrayal of the relationship between men and women in Surfacing.
 - (c) Would you call Cohen's poetry postmodern? Substantiate your argument with reference to Cohen's poetry.
 - (d) Critically examine the sense of loss and suffering in the poems by Cohen that you have studied.
- 4. Comment on any two of the following: 5×2
 - (a) Laura's attitude to Australia.
 - (b) I have written this story wanting to embrace all of you, and it is the best I can do in this language we share.
 - (c) Change and compel, slash us into shape, But not our roots deep in the soil of old.

- 2. Answer any one of the following (within 300 words): 10×1
 - (a) What, according to Tagore, is the principle of unity in India?
 - (b) How do Tagore's reflections on nationalism reveal his view of the nature of imperialism and colonialism? Discuss.
 - (c) "My intention is thus historical". To what extent does Nirad C. Chaudhuri's *The Autobiography of an Unknown Indian* bear out this claim? Discuss with suitable references to the text.
 - (d) Write a note on Nirad C. Chaudhuri's assessment of Michael Madhusudan Dutt as the first Bengali humanist.
 - (e) Bring out the significance of the title of The Discovery of India.

 - (a) Examine Ambedkar's view that in India, political reform has taken precedence over social reform.
 - (b) Give, after Ambedkar, some instances of injustice meted out to the untouchables in India.
 - (c) Show how the image of mother is constructed in the two poems by Namde Dhasal and Jyoti Lanjewar that you have read.
 - (d) Analyse Arjun Dangle's 'Revolution' as a representative Dalit poem.
 - (e) "A comparative study of the Black and Dalit literatures will be, without doubt, highly instructive." Bring out the validity of this statement in the context of the essay, Black Literature and Dalit Literature.
 - (f) Critically comment on the significance of the title of *The Hunt*.

 - (a) The nostalgia for the past in Ramanujan's poetry.
 - (b) 'Love, I haven't the key To unlock His gates'
 - (c) Mahapatra's description of two types of 'hunger' feeding on each other.
 - (d) "In the history of the world there is nothing to compare with the physical torture inflicted on the Blacks"
 - (e) 'I never see you
 in Jetawana's garden
 sitting with closed eyes
 in meditation, in the lotus position;'
 - (f) 'Give me the finger you cut off; that will be my fulcrum.'
 - (g) Tagore's reference to the caste-problem in 'Nationalism in India'.
